GREENSBORO HIT BY NEW SITDOWNS

Cooling-Off Period Ends in City Where Protests at Lunch Counters Began

Special to The New York Times. GREENSBORO, N. C., April 1 -Negroes resumed their sitdown strikes in two chain stores heer today, ending a coolingoff period in the city where the lunch - counter demonstrations began Feb. 1.

A report from Mayor George Roach's Advisory Committee on Community Relations, which was created in an attempt to solve the situation, said that store managers feared a loss in profits if they integrated the counters.

Negro students at the Agricultural and Technical College voted this morning to resume the movement in the S. H. Kress & Co. and F. W. Woolworth stores. Ezell Blair Jr, chairman of the Student Committee for Justice, reported to some 2,000 students that negotiations by the Mayor's committee had failed to open up the counters

on an integrated basis.

By 1 P. M. half a dozen students were sitting at the lunch counters in each of the stores. Four pickets carrying signs marched outside of the stores. There was no trouble and they were not served.
